### MCFA comments to EPA

Since our last member update, MCFA has submitted comments to the Environmental Protection Agency on a range of topics.

MCFA comments are developed through our Technical Committee, which is composed of and led by industry volunteers:

- Extensively challenging a petition from an environmental NGO to revoke neonicotinoid tolerances (Aug. 31, 2020)
- Endorsing two ad-hoc reviewers to help the FIFRA Science Advisory Panel explore use of new methodologies to evaluate potential pesticide neurotoxicity risks to human health (<u>Aug. 17, 2020</u>)
- Challenging draft Endangered Species Act Biological Evaluations for two key pesticides as overly conservative and not reflecting their real-world use (July 2, 2020) END
