## MCFA elects officers, OKs 2023 work plan

Minor Crop Farmer Alliance members convened virtually Feb. 21 for the organization's Annual Meeting. The agenda included kicking off MCFA's 2023 work, electing officers and other MCFA business.

Members re-elected MCFA's current officers:

- Chair Jim Cranney, California Citrus Quality Council
- Vice-Chair Dave Epstein, Northwest Horticultural Council
- Secretary Caroline Stringer, California Fresh Fruit Association
- Treasurer Mike Wenkel, National Potato Council

Wenkel presented 2022 financial reports, reporting that MCFA is financially sound going into 2023.

In addition, members approved MCFA's 2023 Work Plan. Legal counsel Ed Ruckert summarized the work plan's eight priorities:

#### **Technical Committee to** meet June 8

- Engage on Endangered Species Act implementation: See MCFA's January 2023 Member Minute for more details.
- Re-examine the role of epidemiological studies: The 2022 banning of food uses of chlorpyrifos illustrates the risk of Environmental Protection Agency's recent reliance on less rigorous studies in its pesticide risk assessments.
- Advocate for EPA to use actual water monitoring data, rather than modeling, in their drinking water assessments.
- Inform government evaluations of potential impacts on pollinators from pesticide exposure. EPA's ESA workplan update hints that additional, related pesticide label language is forthcoming.
- Encourage harmonization of pesticide registration requirements, including establishing Maximum Residue Levels, among U.S. specialty-crop trading partners.
- Support funding of IR-4 and U.S. Department of Agriculture's Office of Pesticide Management Policy.
- Inform government policies regarding use of antimicrobial products in horticulture.
- Support USDA pesticide-use surveys, by encouraging continued funding and grower participation.

MCFA Chair Jim Cranney closed the meeting by urging members contributing at the lowest levels to increase their support to adequately finance the organization's 2023 work. Read the minutes here. END

#### MCFA makes news

MCFA received considerable attention during the first quarter of the year from industry media outlets for our work sounding the alarm about potential industry impacts of Environmental Protection Agency's proposed changes to how it implements the Endangered Species Act.

MCFA Chair Jim Cranney bylined a Feb. 2 column in The Packer that alerted the specialty-crop industry to this emerging issue. MCFA Vice Chair Dave Epstein spearheaded an April column bylined by Northwest Horticultural Council in *Good Fruit Grower* (see page 40). An MCFA press release summarizing our comments on EPA's proposed workplan update was reported on by Fresh Plaza, Fruit Growers News, The Packer and Produce Blue Book. END
